SUBJECT: Approval of the Annual Plan for Community Development Block Grant Funding for Fiscal Year 2005-2006

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the attached resolution approving Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for Fiscal Year 2005-2006.

BACKGROUND:

Hayward is awarded an annual Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Entitlement from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). A notice of the HUD-required public hearing on the CDBG Annual Action Plan, scheduled for the May 10 Council meeting, was published in *The Daily Review* on April 9, 2005 and citizen comments are being accepted from that date through the hearing. No written comments on the Action Plan have been received.

Approximately \$2,391,500 is available to fund eligible CDBG activities during FY 2005 – 06:

Administration costs for FY 2005-06 CDBG program are estimated at \$430,000 including funds for HUD-required environmental reviews, support for the homeless Continuum of Care Council, and fair labor standards construction wage monitoring. The Projected Program Income includes \$110,000 in anticipated Small Business Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) payments which will recycle into the fund for additional loans. The balance of funds available for other CDBG program activities is \$1,851,500.

CDBG program income results primarily from loan pay-offs by residential borrowers: first-time homebuyers and housing rehabilitation clients who are refinancing or selling their homes. Because mortgage interest rates have continued to rise, substantially fewer loan recipients have refinanced, reducing the amount of residential program income. Congress has capped CDBG public services funding at 15% of the sum of FY 2005-06 entitlement grant plus previous year's program income to ensure that the Block Grant continues to be used for "bricks and mortar" community development improvements and housing. The decreased FY 2004-05 program

income is reflected in a greatly reduced amount available for public services funding (\$368,727) as compared to recent years

DISCUSSION OF CAC AND STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

Thirty proposals for CDBG funds were submitted totaling \$3,169,332. During January 2005, staff conducted site visits with agencies that were first-time applicants and/or for projects that had not received funding recently or for newly-proposed projects. The Citizens Advisory Commission (CAC) Chair appointed an Application Review Committee (ARC) to evaluate proposals and recommend funding allocations. The ARC interviewed each applicant agency on Saturday, February 5. Staff also evaluated each proposal, participated in the ARC interviews and made preliminary recommendations. On February 16th, the ARC's recommendations were discussed by the full CAC which issued its preliminary recommendations.

The Appeals Hearing was conducted March 16th to provide an opportunity for applicants to respond to preliminary recommendations. The CAC heard appeals from five agencies: Salvation Army, Spectrum, Eden Council for Hope and Opportunity (ECHO), Early Adolescent Sobriety to Better A Youth (EASTBAY), and Associated Community Action Program (ACAP). The CAC discussed the appeals and made their final funding recommendations as did staff. FY 2005-06 CAC and Staff Recommendations and Conditions appear in Exhibit B.

Differences between CAC and staff recommendations are discussed below:

Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program (HRLP)

Staff recommends full funding while the CAC supports a reduction of \$68,065, equivalent to 2 – 3 loans. Higher loan maximums are proposed (\$35,000; \$25,000 - mobile homes) to fully address health and safety deficiencies in aging homes and to cover increased construction costs.

Public Services

The CAC and staff agree on these recommendations except for off-setting \$5,000 differences for FVLC and Spectrum Senior Meals. Both recommendations would decrease FVLC's funding from prior years, due to reduced CDBG funds, and the CAC recommends a higher funding for Spectrum's new project. However, this project is also recommended, with staff and Human Services Commission concurrence, for Social Services funding. Staff reasons that the combined funding is adequate for Spectrum while FVLC has greater need for the additional CDBG \$5,000.

Neighborhood Facilities and Improvements

The CAC and staff differ significantly in evaluating some facilities projects' readiness for implementation. Staff recommends \$50,000 to correct additional health and safety items at the Salvation Army's existing facility while the CAC would split these funds between BOSS and EASTBAY. Although both the ARC and the Commission originally agreed on no funding, at the appeal hearing the CAC found persuasive EASTBAY's progress towards starting a residential recovery center for adolescents and recommended \$125,000 for the down payment to purchase a former convalescent facility located at 1782 B Street. Staff has two primary concerns regarding EASTBAY's proposal: appropriateness of the facility and site for this size program which requires a Conditional Use Permit, and lack of track record for the agency and its program model in working with adolescents. A full discussion of the EASTBAY project and the issues appears on page 7 of Exhibit B.

Staff is recommending that the \$125,000 in funding be allocated to Housing Rehabilitation (\$68,065), the Tiburcio Vasquez project (\$31,935), and BOSS (\$25,000). If these amounts are returned to these three projects, there are two differences between the staff and CAC recommendations:

CITY COUNCIL WORKSESSION:

Exhibit A reflects the funding recommendations as discussed during the May 3 worksession. At that meeting, Councilmembers expressed serious concerns about the proposal for the EASTBAY facility acquisition. The table above reflects the only differences between staff and CAC prior to the Appeals Hearing at which the CAC shifted funding to EASTBAY.

NEXT STEPS:

Allocations adopted by Council will be included in the City's annual Action Plan to be forwarded to HUD by May 15, 2005.

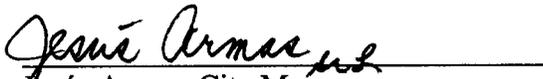

FY 2005-06 CDBG FINAL RECOMMENDATIONS

Proposal #: 1

Applicant: City of Hayward
Project: Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program (HRLP)
Category of Need: Housing Rehabilitation

Amount Requested: \$ 575,000
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 506,935
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 575,000

Agency Description:
Applicant is the City of Hayward.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

The City's Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program (HRLP) provides property rehabilitation assistance on a city-wide basis to lower income homeowners. The objective of the program is to upgrade the housing stock and increase the supply of decent, safe, affordable housing throughout the City. In FY 05-06, the HRLP proposes to rehabilitate at least 12 homes by providing loans up to \$35,000 (\$25,000 for mobile homes).

Comments:

Citizens Advisory Commission:

The need for this program is well established, as indicated by the waiting list of eligible applicants. This program increases the supply of safe, decent, and affordable housing for low-income, elderly, and/or disabled Hayward residents, through the renovation of existing housing stock. Funding is recommended in the amount of \$506,935.

CED Staff:

The staff concurs with the CAC's rationale but recommends full funding to avoid reducing the number of clients served.

Project: Minor Home Repair Program (MHRP) and Accessibility Program
Category of Need: Housing Rehabilitation

Amount Requested: \$ 350,000

Agency Description:
Applicant is the City of Hayward.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

The City's Minor Home Repair Program (MHRP) provides minor home repair and accessibility services to lower income households that are headed by people who have disabilities or are elderly. The program's services are intended to address deferred maintenance problems that can jeopardize the health and safety of the home occupants. Grants may also be made to improve accessibility for homeowners and tenants who have disabilities. During FY 05-06, the MHRP proposes to provide grants of up to \$5,000 for at least forty-five Hayward residents.

Comments:

Citizens Advisory Commission:

This program continues to provide an important service to Hayward residents who have disabilities or who are elderly. Funding is recommended in the amount of \$300,000.

CED Staff:

The demand for this program's services is very high, especially among low-income mobile home owners who have few resources to make repairs to meet the City's health and safety standards. Staff concurs with the CAC's funding recommendation.

Agency Description:
Applicant is the City of Hayward.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

The City is requesting funds for the second (of twelve) year's mortgage payments to acquire the former Boys and Girls Club of Hayward facility, located on Ruus Road in south Hayward. The facility serves youth and adults in one of the City's lowest-income areas, and is considered an important resource for local residents. The Hayward Area Recreation and Park District (HARD) has worked closely with the City and has committed to providing program services at the site. The funds requested would be used exclusively for acquisition of the facility.

Citizens Advisory Commission:

The CAC recognizes the importance of supporting the continuation of services to South Hayward youth and their families out of this facility. It is recommended that the amount requested be granted and that a funding plan to sustain future program operations be developed.

CED Staff:

Staff concurs with the CAC's recommendation.

Proposal #: 4

Applicant: BACS – Hedco House
Project: Replace Flooring
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvements

Amount Requested: \$ 39,380
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

Since its inception in 1953, the Bay Area Community Services' (BACS) mission has been to improve the quality of life for people who have needs specifically related to age and/or disability. BACS's core services provide alternatives to institutionalization for Alameda County residents who are elderly or who suffer from chronic mental illness. The agency's programs include Senior Nutrition/Meals on Wheels, Affordable Home Care, Senior Transportation, Crisis Residential Program, and Adult Day Care. Hedco House (located in Hayward) provides a structured day program for 70 unduplicated Hayward residents who have severe and persistent mental illness.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

Hedco House (in Hayward) requests \$39,380 to replace vinyl tile flooring throughout the facility, and to make repairs to the wood sub-floor where necessary to ensure the new floor's durability and longevity.

Comments:

Citizens Advisory Commission:

Based on the staff's site review, it appears that the identified problem areas of the floor consist primarily of cracked or peeling floor tiles. Approximately \$18,000 remains unexpended from the Hedco House FY 2003-04 (completed) construction project budget. It is recommended that these funds be used to replace the damaged floor tiles in lieu of funding the replacement of flooring throughout the facility.

CED Staff:

Staff concurs with the Commission's recommendation.

Proposal #: 5

Applicant: Building Opportunities for Self-Sufficiency (BOSS)
Project: Rehabilitation at three Hayward sites (Pacheco Court, Meekland Place, and South County Shelter)
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvements

Amount Requested: \$ 130,000
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 76,079
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 51,079

Agency Description:

BOSS was founded in 1972 to fight against the root causes of poverty and homelessness, and is dedicated to helping people who are poor, homeless, and/or have a disability, achieve health and self-sufficiency. BOSS operates three supportive housing programs in Hayward: the *South County Homeless Project*, a 24-bed homeless shelter serving single adults with mental illness; *Pacheco Court* which is comprised of 10 housing units for mentally ill adults with families and single adults; and *Meekland Place* which is 8 shared living housing units (serving 21 adults with mental illness).

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

BOSS requests \$130,000 to address deferred maintenance issues at its three Hayward sites. The funds would be used to make repairs at the shelter, would replace failed heating systems and water heaters where necessary at Pacheco Court and Meekland Place; would replace the roof at Pacheco Court; replace single-paned glass windows and doors with more energy-efficient materials; remove tree roots that are damaging the sewer line and cracking the foundation at Pacheco Court, repair of stairs and handrails leading to the staff office at Meekland Place; and install screen doors on all the housing units.

Comments:

Citizens Advisory Commission:

The CAC recommends funding for this project in the amount of \$76,079, and further recommends that a portion of the funds be used to conduct an evaluation of the condition of the facilities, so that a realistic budget for correcting all the health and safety related problems may be developed. Funding is not recommended for use at the Alameda County-owned shelter site (on A Street).

CED Staff:

Staff recommends \$51,079 to address the most serious deficiencies at Pacheco Court and Meekland Place.

Proposal #: 6

Applicant: Community Resources for Independent Living (CRIL)
Project: Installation of Energy-Efficient Windows and Improved Site Security
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvement

Amount Requested: \$ 151,286
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 90,000
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 90,000

Agency Description:

CRIL is one of 28 independent living centers in California, and has served mid- and southern Alameda County from its Hayward offices for thirty years. CRIL's mission is to support, empower, and teach skills to people with disabilities so that they can more effectively participate in community and daily life activities.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

CRIL requests funds to increase the current facility renovation project budget so that the agency's single-paned aluminum windows may be replaced with energy-efficient windows, without the necessity of eliminating other important elements from the current scope of work. CRIL also requests funds to pay for site modifications as necessary, triggered by the City's own requirements (e.g., new trash enclosure). At the time of the application's submission, the requested amount included approximately \$50,000 to pay for asbestos abatement, if necessary. Since that time, the flooring has been tested and results indicated the flooring material does not contain asbestos. Therefore, the requested amount is reduced to \$100,000.

Citizens Advisory Commission:

Since the submission of this application, it has been determined that the site modifications originally requested (e.g. new trash enclosure) will not be necessary. Consequently, the CAC recommends funding in the amount of \$90,000 so that the project may be completed.

CED Staff:

Staff concurs with the CAC's recommendation.

Proposal #: 7

Applicant: Early Adolescent Sobriety to Better a Youth (EASTBAY)
Project: Residential Recovery Center for Adolescents (Facility Acquisition)
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvements

Amount Requested: \$ 200,000
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 125,000
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

This is a start-up agency that proposes to open a 15-bed residential recovery facility at 1782 B Street, in Hayward for homeless or probationary adolescents aged 12 to 17 years whose previous criminal behavior and drug and alcohol abuse indicate the need for a structured residential program. The Program activities proposed include individual and group therapies, academic remediation, and non-clinical behavioral recovery, similar to 12-step programs. The agency has achieved site control via a lease-option agreement with the current owner, but requires a conditional use permit in order to be granted a Community Care license, which qualifies the agency to receive Foster Care payments for operations. The program has applied for a mortgage on the property to Bank of the West.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

EASTBAY is requesting down payment assistance so the agency may purchase the building by December 2005.

Comments:

Citizens Advisory Commission:

The CAC recommends \$125,000 for down payment assistance based on EASTBAY's progress towards obtaining additional financing and licensing.

CED Staff:

Staff continues to have concerns about the feasibility of this proposed project, including: 1) availability of the required three months of operating expenses prior to receiving State licensure and County funding; 2) whether the proposed operating budget is reasonable given the absence of clarity on the bed-night rate to be awarded, actual staff costs and facility operating costs; and 3) the qualifications and experience of the staff responsible for program oversight and implementation. Staff also has questions about the appropriateness of this treatment model, originally designed for adult military veterans, for teens. The program requires a Conditional Use Permit, which was not applied for until mid-March and has yet to be heard by the Planning Commission. Initial neighborhood meetings indicate serious concerns regarding the facility. Staff believes that if a Conditional Use Permit were granted, the program could proceed on the basis of the lease currently in place for the property and that purchase of the property is not a precondition to the program's success.

CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

A Special Place is comprised of two programs operating from separate buildings on the same parcel of land in Hayward: a preschool program and infant/toddler program. Both structures were originally purchased using (in part) City of Hayward CDBG funds. ESP has recently discontinued the infant/toddler program due to the program's inability to generate enough income to cover its expenses.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

A Special Place is requesting funds to tear down and replace the building that currently houses its preschool program at A Special Place. The structure is a portable building, originally purchased and installed in part using City of Hayward CDBG funds in 1984.

Comments:

Citizens Advisory Commission:

Outstanding concerns remain regarding the condition of the preschool portable, and less expensive repairs would be a better alternative to total building replacement. While the applicant has indicated a desire and intent to resume infant/toddler care services out of this site in the future, it is not clear how program expenses will be covered at that time (as this was the reason for recently discontinuing these services). Based on these outstanding issues, funding for this project is not recommended.

Staff concurs with the CAC's recommendation.

Applicant: Hayward Area Recreation and Parks Department (HARD)
Project: Sunset Athletic Field Revitalization
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvements

Amount Requested: \$ 184,250
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 67,125
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 67,125

Agency Description:

HARD is an independent special use district providing park and recreation services for the residents living within its jurisdiction, which includes parts of the City of Hayward, Castro Valley, San Lorenzo, and unincorporated areas of the Ashland, Cherryland, and Fairview districts. HARD is the largest independent recreation district in the State of California.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

Phase 1 of the Sunset field rehabilitation project (irrigation) is complete. HARD is requesting funds to complete phase 2 of the Sunset Field rehabilitation project. Phase 2 includes turf installation, fence repair, replacement of bleachers and bathroom fixtures, roof repair on the bathroom/concession stand structure, and painting the backstops and score booths. At the agency's Application Review Committee interview, HARD's representative stated that due to cost under-runs on the project to date, HARD's funding request has been reduced from the original \$184,250 to \$92,125.

Citizens Advisory Commission:

The CAC recommends funding in the amount of \$67,125 to complete the primary elements of the project (i.e., installation of the turf). HARD is encouraged to seek additional funding from other sources as necessary to complete the remaining items contained in the original scope of work.

CED Staff:

The staff concurs with the CAC recommendation and rationale.

Proposal #: 10

Applicant: Kidango
Project: Childcare Center Floor Rehabilitation
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvement

Amount Requested: \$ 35,000
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 20,000
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 20,000

Agency Description:

Kidango operates 41 childcare centers located in Alameda, Santa Clara, and San Francisco counties. Two of Kidango's childcare centers are located in Hayward. Over 75% of the 2,400 children in Kidango's care each day are from low-income families who qualify for childcare subsidies. All families enrolled at Kidango pay fees based on a sliding scale according to family size and income. Kidango also offers parent education classes, mental health services for children and their families, and social services referrals.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

Kidango is requesting funds to replace the carpet and sheet flooring at its Glen Berry childcare center with wood laminate flooring.

\$20,000 is recommended, provided a fully funded scope of work may be identified and scheduled so the funds may be promptly expended.

CED Staff:

The staff concurs with the CAC's recommendation and rationale.

Applicant: Salvation Army
Project: Community Center
Category of Need: Neighborhood Facilities and Improvement

Amount Requested: \$ 150,000
Citizens Advisory Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 50,000

Agency Description:

The Salvation Army operates a food pantry, distributes sack lunches, and offers a Sunday evening hot meal after chapel services. The Salvation Army also administers a PG&E-funded voucher program to assist low-income households facing PG&E shut off notices, provides information and referral, and has operated a City-funded motel voucher program.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

The City's CDBG funding is specifically for the provision of late night and weekend staffing, which will not be necessary while construction is underway. Therefore funding is recommended in the reduced amount of \$40,000.

Spectrum also works with adult children of seniors, to help them review and consider various alternatives regarding the care of their aging parents.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2005-06:

This project would deliver hot meals to nearly two hundred seniors who live in low-income senior housing. Well-balanced meals would be served at congregate meal sites, thereby ensuring a measure of balanced nutrition, as well as providing a means of social support and interaction. These two elements are intended to help maintain these seniors' independence as long as practicable. The proposed sites are: Josephine Lum Lodge, Eden Garden Estate Mobile Home Park, Spanish Ranch I, and Hayward Mobile Country Club.

ACAP's proposal did not follow the City's RFP format, and perhaps as a result of that did not provide enough specificity to evaluate the likely impact of the project on the City's low-income residents. A \$250,000 allocation would be rather large by City standards, and although the application provided a general County-wide overview of the project, the application was not competitive with other applications that proposed activities that would address the specific acute needs of the Hayward community in measurable ways. Funding for this project is not recommended.

The Child Care Initiative Project provides technical assistance and training to unlicensed providers of small family day care centers in order to achieve licensure. If funded, sixteen providers would receive services to help them attain licensure. In previous years, this project was funded using City of Hayward Social Services Funding. Per HUD guidance, this is an eligible CDBG activity in the Economic Development category of funding (as a microenterprise activity).
