ladies and gentlemen,

first, this is a communication from myself as a private citizen and should not be construed as representing the views of the prospect hill neighborhood association.

second, my apologies to those who received the wrong attachment regarding the maple court condominium project.

third, i attach the correct attachment.

this attachment is a copy of a picture and caption that ran in the daily review on march 23,1959. the original is on file at the hayward area historical society.

the picture is of james davis, a university of california archaeologist who is shown taking a picture of native american remains said to be a teenage girl and an adult male retrieved from maple court on march 22, 1959 by city street department workmen.

the archaeologist apparently opined that the bones, of the costonoan tribal group, could date anywhere from 1500 B.C.to 1000A.D.

also in the picture is bill williford, water department foreman and jane barnes of public works.

where exactly on maple court were these remains found? in front of the proposed 44 unit condominium project on maple street that was approved by the planning commission last thursday? perhaps public works has records? perhaps the water department has records? please consider this a request for information on this issue.

i would submit that the strong possibility of native american burial sites in the vicinity requires further conditions be considered to insure proper respect be given.

i am concurrently asking city council members to call this matter up so that we, the prospect hill neighborhood association, or any of our members, do not have to pay the fee to appeal the item. i request any council member so inclined to be in direct communication with greg jones, who is currently the president of the prospect hill neighborhood assoication.

should this matter come before a public body with appropriate notice to the adjacent neighborhood, i would expect that this article would be considered a reason NOT to allow a mitigated negative declaration on this project. i would certainly encourage council to press for a full environmental review on all of the issues.

those of you interested in my theory that we built hayward on an ancient native american cemetary are invited to my history walk (sponsored by the hayward area historical society) designed to explore the hypothesis at 10 am on august 25, 2012.

Pollutant Measure 'Inadequate'

The "yardstick" used to measure the amount of pollutants from industrial smokestacks is "inadequate," industrial leaders told Bay Area Pollution Control Advisory Council.

In a session preliminary to public

hearings, industrial spokesmen said "the Ringelmann Chart is inadequate . . . to measure the amount of pollutants discharged into the air by industrial smokestacks."

The session precedes hearing on Regulation 2, which will regulate emissions from incinerators, heating and power plants.


Paul Arnold of U. S. Pipe and

Foundry's plant in Decoto, said the Ringelmann Chart "developed to measure pollutants in black smoke is meaningless in determining the amounts of similar emissions in plumes of light smoke discharged from stacks in Bay Area plants."

The next preliminary session will be held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in San Francisco.

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
