SUBJECT: FY 2007-08 Social Services Funding Recommendations

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council review and comment on this report.

BACKGROUND:

On November 27, 2006 the City released the FY 2007-08 Social Services Program Request for Proposals in which it was announced that \$450,000 from the City's General Fund was available to support the delivery of social services to the Hayward community. This is the second of two years in which Council allocated a \$50,000 increase to the Social Services Program budget. In light of this increase, and in consideration of the reduction in available federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to support Public Services next year, community agencies were encouraged to submit only housing-related proposals to the CDBG program, and direct all other community service funding applications to the City's Social Services program. This is consistent with the way in which the two programs were administered during last year's funding cycle.

A total of 33 social services proposals were submitted by the January 17, 2007 deadline, totaling \$965,382 in requests. The Human Services Commission (HSC) established a Proposal Review Committee (PRC), which interviewed all 33 applicants on Saturday, March 3, 2007. The interview process enabled the Commissioners and staff to obtain a better understanding of the proposed projects as well as the applicants' capabilities for carrying out those projects.

Based on the independent review of all the proposals by Commission members, and the input provided by the PRC and staff, the Commission then developed Preliminary Funding Recommendations at its regular meeting on March 7, 2007. Applicants were subsequently informed in writing about the Preliminary Funding Recommendations from the Commission and staff, along with the rationale for those recommendations. Each applicant then had the option to respond to the recommendations. Seven (7) applicants submitted a written response. Some expressed gratitude for the funding recommendations and others clarified points raised in the rationale statements and/or described the impact that the recommendations would have on the proposed projects if adopted. On April 4, 2007, the Commission established its final funding recommendations after considering the written responses from applicants and the funding recommendations of staff.

DISCUSSION OF HSC AND STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

Of the 33 proposals submitted, the Commission recommends support for 23 projects. Of these, 4 are newly funded projects; 12 are recommended for an increase over the amount allocated in FY 2006-07; and 2 are recommended for a decrease from current funding levels.

One of the applications recommended for a decrease in funding (Proposal No. 10) was submitted by Community Resources for Independent Living (CRIL). In FY 2006-07, CRIL received a Social Services grant in the amount of \$60,000; the largest grant that year (the average grant size was \$17,000). At the time it was noted that, if the services proposed by CRIL were to continue to be supported using Social Services funding, the Commission expressed interest in bringing the amount allocated to the agency more in line with other Social Services funded projects. This is the primary reasoning behind the recommendations from the Commission and staff to fund the CRIL project in the amount of \$40,000 in FY 2007-08. It is noted that this is still the largest funding recommendation, compared to the \$19,000 average grant amount recommended for next year.

The reason that CRIL received a large Social Services grant last year was that the agency was previously allocated \$66,500 from the City through two different sources: \$48,500 came from the CDBG program and \$18,000 came from the Social Services Program. Beginning in FY 2006-07, the City decided to fund only housing-related projects through the CDBG program. Consequently, the large Social Services grant given to CRIL that year was intended to mitigate this impact.

A decrease in funding is also recommended for Proposal No. 27 - the South Hayward Parish Food Pantry project. This was because the applicant requested less than what was allocated the previous year, and both the Commission and staff recommend that the project be funded at the level requested.

Differences between the Commission and Staff Recommendations:

When the Council adopted the FY 2006-07 City budget, it included support for Eden Information and Referral's (Eden I & R) 2-1-1 Project in the amount of \$30,000; this is a national 3-digit phone number set aside by the Federal Communications Commission so that access to health and human services can be made available to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. In Alameda County the cost of this service is shared among 14 cities, the County and the private sector. Funding for this service was proposed on a per capita basis, with Hayward's share equaling \$50,000.

In FY 2006-07, Council had previously approved the allocation of \$20,000 in Social Services funding to support Eden I & R's Community Housing and Information Network (CHAIN) Phone Line. Because the two services were being merged with one another, this allocation was credited toward the City's \$50,000 share of cost for the 2-1-1 service. The request for the additional \$30,000 was submitted to the City after the FY 2006-07 Social Services funding cycle had concluded, and so was considered by Council as part of its review of the overall City budget. It should be noted that the City allocation was predicated on total funding for the project being raised from other public, private and philanthropic sources by January 1, 2007. This deadline was not met, nor has the funding requirement been satisfied as of this writing.

Because this is the second year of a two-year City budget cycle, Eden I & R thought that in FY 2007-08 the City's financial support for the 2-1-1 Project would be allocated in the same fashion that it was in FY 2006-07. (The Council's action only pertained to FY 2006-07, and was silent with regard to FY 2007-08.) Therefore, the agency did not include the full cost of the 2-1-1 Project in its recent Social Services funding application. Consequently, the Commission's funding recommendation provides only \$20,000 to support the CHAIN / 2-1-1 Phone-Line service, and \$15,000 for Eden I & R's Emergency Hotel Voucher Program (for a total allocation of \$35,000 – See Exhibit A, Proposal No. 14). The Commission recommends that the additional \$30,000 needed to fulfill the City's share of cost for the 2-1-1 service again be allocated by Council from sources other than the Social Services program budget.

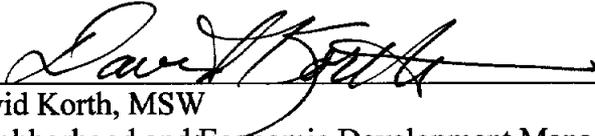
Staff recommends that the \$30,000 allocation needed to fulfill the City's share of cost for the 2-1-1 Project be incorporated into the FY 2007-08 Social Services budget. As was previously noted, last year's request was submitted to the Council after the Social Services funding process had already concluded. That is not the case this year, so it is not too late to consider this option at this time. To accommodate this, staff's funding recommendations differ from the Commission's in two additional areas. It is recommended that the South Hayward Neighborhood Collaborative project (Proposal No. 26) receive an increase from its current grant of \$10,000 to \$15,000, rather than to \$30,000 as is recommended by the Commission. It is also recommended that the new youth development project submitted by St. Rose Hospital (Proposal No. 30) be funded in the amount of \$10,000, rather than at the \$25,000 level recommended by the Commission. These funding differences are presented below.

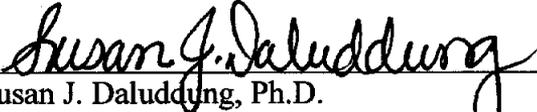
The City Council is scheduled to conduct its Social Services Funding Public Hearing and make final funding decisions at its regular meeting on April 24, 2007.

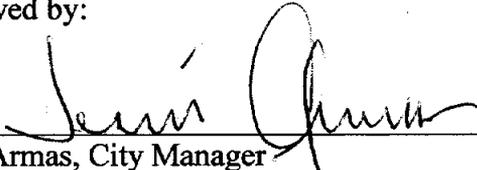

Proposal #: 1

Applicant: Afghan Coalition
Project: Multi-Service Project for Hayward Afghan Refugees and Immigrants

Amount Requested: \$60,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

The Afghan Coalition in collaboration with four partner organizations proposes to provide services to low-income, disadvantaged Afghan refugee and immigrants in Hayward.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

This application proposes to provide multiple services designed to foster self-sufficiency through information and referral, social support and advocacy to refugees and immigrants. The project will focus its services toward low-income Afghan and other middle-eastern refugees and immigrants residing in Hayward. The Afghan Coalition currently is located in the City of Fremont and has served southern Alameda County residents for many years, including Hayward residents. City of Hayward funds will be used to establish an office in Hayward so as to make available services more easily accessible to its residents.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Rationale: While this proposal, if funded, would bring the services of this organization into Hayward to make them more accessible to Hayward residents, the extent to which the Afghan Coalition has coordinated these plans with established Hayward-based organizations that serve the same population is unclear. Since the Hayward-based agency (namely the Afghan International Refugee Support Services) has submitted an application to provide similar services to more of the same target population for less money partnership with another agency (Proposal No.5), the Commission and staff do not recommend funding for this project.

Proposal #: 2

Applicant: All Saints Church
Project: Outreach Event to Hayward High School Teenagers – Making Healthy Choices

Amount Requested: \$23,800
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

All Saints Church is located on Second Street in Hayward. The church has been working with teenagers through various ministries. They have an elementary school and a faith formation program that serves over 300 families.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

All Saints Church proposes to outreach to public high schools in Hayward and empower the community to help teenagers make healthy choices. This will be accomplished through high school assemblies, a large group rally with a celebrity key note speaker, followed-up by small group meetings.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Rationale: The City funds requested are to cover the costs of school assemblies in local high schools; program expenses associated with a series of six-week small group meetings; and (the largest expense) a celebrity key-note speaker for a single event large group teen rally. The extent to which the high schools in the area have agreed to the proposed assemblies is unclear, as is the basis for determining the number of teens that would actually participate in the planned events and subsequent small group meetings. There is also a clear religious element to the mission of the project which poses a concern as to whether this would be an appropriate use of City funds. For these reasons, both the Commission and staff do not recommend funding for this proposal.

Proposal #: 3

Applicant: Bay Area Community Services (BACS)
Project: Hedco House Creative Living Center

Amount Requested: \$20,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$20,000
CED Staff Recommendation: \$20,000

Agency Description:

The Bay Area Community Services (BACS) develops and delivers specialized services to older adults and persons with mental illness through out the East Bay. The agency's primary goal is to offer appropriate, cost-effective alternatives to institutionalization that improve the quality of life for those that the agency serves.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

The Hedco House Creative Living Center provides day rehabilitation services to adults with severe and persistent mental illness. Specific services include: prevocational activities, socialization, education, counseling, crisis intervention, service coordination, treatment planning, and assistance with employment. A minimum of 70 adults with mental health disabilities will benefit from the proposed services.

Rationale: Hedco House continues to be the only community-based program to provide quality outpatient services in Hayward to Hayward residents who have severe long-term mental health disabilities. The services provided are effective and well-coordinated with other government and community based health and social service programs. For these reasons, both the Commission and staff recommend that this project be supported in the amount requested.

Proposal #: 4

Applicant: Bay Area Community Services (BACS)
Project: Woodroe Place – Crises Residential Program

Amount Requested: \$30,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

The Bay Area Community Services (BACS) develops and delivers specialized services to older adults and persons with mental illness through out the East Bay. The agency’s primary goal is to offer appropriate, cost-effective alternatives to institutionalization that improve the quality of life for those that the agency serves.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

Woodroe Place Crisis Residential Program is a community based alternative to psychiatric hospitalization. Woodroe Place offers a structured day, including group and individual meetings, skill building activities and workshops. The average length of stay for its clients is two weeks. The agency proposes to serve a minimum of 40 low-income Hayward residents.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Rationale: As a residential program, this proposal constitutes a “housing-related” project and so, in accordance with City policies, would be more appropriately considered under the City’s Community Development Block Grant program. For this reason, both the Commission and staff do not recommend Social Services funding be used to support this project.

Proposal #: 5

Applicant: Bay Area Immigrant & Refugee Services (BAIRS) & Afghan International Refugee Support Services (AIRSS)
Project: Hayward Low Income Bridge Project – Support Services for Hayward Immigrant and Refugee Community Members

Amount Requested: \$34,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$14,600
CED Staff Recommendation: \$14,600

Agency Description:

The Bay Area Immigrant and Refugee Services (BAIRS) and the Afghan and International Refugee Support Service (AIRSS) propose to provide comprehensive services to Hayward low-income residents, specifically the immigrant and refugee families.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

BAIRS/AIRSS proposes to provide a range of comprehensive services to different ethnic groups residing in Hayward. Services include: employment assistance, youth services, parenting, counseling for child and substance abuse, victims of domestic violence, translation and interpretation, immigration services and information and referral.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Rationale: The Hayward-based Afghan International Refugee Support Services (AIRSS), headed by Dr. Ali Mardanzai has teamed up with Mr. Rahim Aurang, Executive Director of Bay Area Immigrant and Refugee Services (BAIRS) to deliver a comprehensive array of case management and support services to at least 200 low-income Hayward residents who originate from Afghanistan and other middle-eastern countries. BAIRS will serve as the fiscal agent for this partnership and AIRSS, a South Hayward Neighborhood Collaborative partner with its offices located in the Social Services Wing of Westminster Hills Church in South Hayward, will be the location out of which services will be delivered. The target population to be served has long been an underserved component of the Hayward community due to language and culture barriers. This proposal represents a good partnership between two long-standing organizations that aim to address the needs of these Hayward residents, and so both the Commission and staff recommend that this project be supported. However, due to the need to support many other worthy projects, it is recommended that FY 2007-08 Social Services funding be limited to \$14,600.

Proposal #: 6

Applicant: Ballet Lisanga
Project: The African In Me Youth Project (AIM)

Amount Requested: \$10,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

The Ballet Lisanga, The African In Me Youth Project (AIM), teaches participants the history, culture, folklore, textile arts, adornment crafts, music, dance and drum of the Mongo people of the Congo, Central in Africa and Bambara people of Mali, West Africa.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

The AIM Project proposes to conduct their program from September 2007 through June 2008. The participants will engage in organized activities when school is not in session. This will be a free after school cultural enrichment program that proposes to target low-income Hayward youth that have limited enrichment opportunities. Through African dance the program hopes to directly enhance the physical performance and agility of their participants.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Rationale: While this proposal represents a worthy concept, the funding application did not clearly demonstrate that this organization has the administrative capacity to meet the City's fund accounting and reporting requirements. Additionally, the proposal did not clearly demonstrate that the demand for the proposed services, nor the financial support from other funding sources, exists. While the Commission and staff do not recommend funding at this time, the applicant is encouraged to work with City staff to identify other funding and/or partnership opportunities with other after-school programs operated by the Hayward Area Park and Recreation District (HARD), the Hayward Unified School District, Chabot College National Youth Sports Program and other more established full-time non-profit organizations that offer after-school youth services.

Proposal #: 7

Applicant: Be A Mentor, Inc.
Project: Cesar Chavez Middle School Mentoring Program

Amount Requested: \$50,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$ 0
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 0

Agency Description:

Be a Mentor, Inc. is a program that matches volunteer mentors with at-risk youth. This program affords the opportunity to create beneficial long-term friendships with adult, volunteer mentors who act as role models, coaches and guides.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

The new Cesar Chavez Middle Schools Mentoring Program, collaboration between Be A Mentor, Inc. and Hayward Unified School District, proposes to create 50 matches between adult, volunteer mentors and students. With the help of mentors, the program proposes to assist students with increasing their self-esteem and practical experiential knowledge required to become successful adults and show academic progress.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Rationale: Concern was raised by the applicant's stated methodologies for recruiting adult volunteer mentors via such avenues as the internet to be matched with minor age students in this mentorship program. Even though it was explained by the applicant that extensive background checks are done on the adult volunteers prior to matching them with students, it was not clearly demonstrated that adequate safeguards would be in place to protect students in the program when they are alone with their mentors. For these reasons funding for this project is not recommended.

Proposal #: 8

Applicant: Bridge of Faith Church
Project: Meals of Love – Hot Food Program

Amount Requested: \$10,000
Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$ 6,000
CED Staff Recommendation: \$ 6,000

Agency Description:

The Bridge of Faith Church is located on Whitman Street in Hayward. The church provides a variety of services to the working poor and homeless individuals/families in Hayward. They are located in a low-income target neighborhood area next to Tennyson High School in South Hayward.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

The Meals of Love program proposes to provide prepared hot meals on Mondays and Wednesdays each week. The program also provides grocery bags full of unprepared food to low-income individuals and families. Complete dinners are prepared and distributed during the holiday season. The program is also partnering with HUSD's Tennyson High school to develop and care for a community-type garden on the Church's property adjacent to the high school. This will not only produce food for the food give-a-way program, but also a service-learning opportunity for the students.

Previous Social Services Funding Awarded to Applicant:

Project	Amount	Fiscal year

Rationale: This program is the only food program in south Hayward that prepares and delivers hot food to those in need. The partnership with Tennyson High School also presents a great opportunity for Tennyson High School students to learn about the science behind gardening as well as social issues such as hunger and poverty, while supporting a community service aimed at addressing those issues. While the food program is operated by a faith-based organization, assurances have been given by the applicant that there are no religious activities or requirements associated with delivering food to those in need. Furthermore, the applicant has been provided a copy of the City's non-discrimination requirements and has conveyed that these do not pose a conflict. For these reasons, both the Commission and staff recommend that this project be supported. However, due to the need to support other worthy projects, it is recommended that funding be limited to \$6,000.

Proposal #: 9

Applicant: Community Alliance for Special Education (CASE)
Project: Hayward Special Education Advocacy Project

Amount Requested: \$12,040

Human Services Commission Recommendation: \$12,000

CED Staff Recommendation: \$12,000

Agency Description:

The Community Alliance for Special Education (CASE) offers services designed to protect the educational rights of children with disabilities, and works to promote better understanding and cooperation among parents, the special education service community and the public schools.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

This project is designed to help ensure that children with disabilities who are at risk for school failure receive appropriate special education services. Working cooperatively with the Hayward Unified School District (HUSD), the project will assist students with disabilities and their parents to fully participate in the special education process in order to optimize services for the student. A minimum of 75 Hayward students with disabilities will be assisted by this project.

Rationale: For many years CASE has effectively bridged the interests of students with special needs (and their families) and the fiscal constraints faced by the Hayward Unified School District in a non-adversarial manner. The services offered are seen as key to helping many low-income Hayward students with disabilities to succeed. For these reasons both the Commission and staff recommend that this project be supported in the amount of \$12,000.

Agency Description:

Community Resources for Independent Living (CRIL) has a mission to support, empower, and teach skills to persons with disabilities (consumers) so that they are able to more fully participate in the community and in daily life activities. A particular focus is on teaching rights and skills to empower consumers to obtain self-identified goals that lead to maximum choice and participation in their lives.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

Proposed services, designed to assist consumers in achieving their self-identified goals, include the operation of a personal assistant registry, benefits advocacy, teaching independent living skills, peer support, and information and referral. A minimum of 250 Hayward residents with disabilities will benefit from the proposed services.

In FY 2006-2007 CRIL received a disproportionately large allocation of Social Services funding in comparison with other supported projects. CRIL received a \$60,000 grant while the average size grant allocated to other projects was \$17,000. These funds were used well, and as stated above, the agency continues to provide quality, needed, services to Hayward residents with disabilities. However, in order to bring the amount of Social Services funding allocated to this project more in line with other supported projects, it is recommended that the amount allocated to CRIL be reduced to \$40,000.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

A variety of services are offered through the DSFRC including: the provision of emergency food, clothing, employment training and job placement, acute medical care for uninsured and underinsured adults and children, subsidized child care services, mental health services, utility assistance, assistance with enrollment into the Healthy Families health insurance program, emergency motel vouchers, case management and referral services, holiday toy and food basket programs, Volunteer Income Tax Assistance as well as economic literacy workshops.

Additionally, EBAC's Child Assault Prevention (CAP) project proposes to reach a minimum of 3,555 lower-income Hayward children at these same schools through classroom-based child assault prevention workshops.

The agency proposes to enhance the existing integrated mental health, substance abuse and housing-related services to their clients that are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. They intend to serve an additional 50 clients with social service funds. The Hayward outpatient program currently serves approximately over 250 clients per year.

Additionally, the submitted proposal was not clear regarding the extent to which these, or other funding sources (i.e., MediCal or private health insurance) are available to pay for the proposed services. The proposal also did not clearly identify the extent to which this program networks or collaborates with other Hayward-based programs that serve the same target population. For these reasons, both the Commission and staff do not recommend funding at this time.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

Eden I & R proposes to continue to provide services to Hayward residents who phone the Community Housing and Information Network (CHAIN) line. This would be accomplished, in part, by implementation of 2-1-1 (the three digit dialing phone number that will allow easier and faster access to CHAIN services), and by an enhanced outreach effort. The second component of this proposal provides motel vouchers for a minimum of 85 nights to Hayward individuals and families who need them on an emergency basis.

For this reason, both the Commission and staff recommend continued support of these projects in the amount of \$35,000, of which \$15,000 is to support the Motel Voucher Program, and \$20,000 for the CHAIN phone line, including the new 2-1-1 feature.

The proposed project will provide licensed child care for low-income Hayward residents at its A Special Place Child Care Center. The funding requested will be to assist in the support of eight to twelve child care slots for children, ages two to Kindergarten age.

Rationale: The cost of licensed child care is high making it particularly challenging for low-income Hayward families to afford such care. City Social Services funding has not generally been used, however, to augment the budget of a fee-for-service program as is proposed by this application (most social services supported with this funding source are provided at no-cost to those served). To more directly address the need for more affordable child care, the City has instead used its Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to help purchase portable child care facilities (as was done with this agency), as well as to support the development of 15 to 20 licensed child care micro-businesses over the past couple of years. These new licensed providers each offer 6 to 12 child care slots, thereby creating 90 to 240 new affordable child care slots per year for low-income Hayward families. The support of child care micro-enterprises through the CDBG program is a more cost-effective way to increase the availability of affordable child care in the community than what has been proposed by this application. So that limited Social Service funding can be used to support other needed services to low-income Hayward families, it is not recommended by either the Commission or staff that this project be funded.

The Hayward Child Trauma Treatment Project will continue to provide treatment to Hayward low-income sexual abuse clients and expand treatment to Hayward low-income children victimized by physical and emotional abuse, including those children who have witnessed family violence. The project will serve at least 32 low income clients with individual and family counseling.

The funds will increase the Volunteer Coordinator from part-time to full-time, and increase recruitment of interns from higher education/training sites, as well as community volunteers from corporations, organizations and churches.

The requested funds will allow HARD and HUSD to continue the Longwood YEP project. It is expected that a minimum of 100 low-income Hayward children will benefit from this program.

Drug-free and alcohol-free social and community services activities are also provided to program participants who otherwise have limited opportunities to participate in such "healthy life-style" activities.

SAVE-COPS advocates, working with the Hayward Police Department, proposes to provide crisis intervention services to a minimum of 800 homeless and/or low-income Hayward residents who are victims of domestic violence. The individuals served will receive crises related services and when needed specialized case management services from the COPS advocates. All patrol officers will also receive ongoing training in responding appropriately to incidents of domestic violence.

The Senior Services Foundation helps to improve the quality of life of seniors in the community by identifying their needs, providing advocacy on their behalf and developing services based on unmet needs.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

The Friendly Visitor Program will continue the expansion of this project to additional low-income, isolated seniors residing in the city of Hayward. Focus will continue on outreach and education regarding services to the Hayward community members and services providers.

Agency Description:

The South Hayward Neighborhood Collaborative (SHNC) is made up of community and faith-based organizations who share the common mission to provide support to low-income children and families. The “lead agencies” that form the management team of SHNC include: La Familia Counseling Services (the fiscal agent for this application), Eden Youth and Family Center, Westminster Hills Presbyterian Church, Glad Tidings Church and St. Rose Hospital. Many other public and private nonprofit agencies make up the other active partners of the collaborative. The Family Resource Center, located at Westminster Hills Church South Hayward, and staffed by employees of La Familia Counseling services, is the hub of the SHNC. This centrally located, easily accessible, facility is where multi-lingual SHNC Family Advocates (case managers) provide support and advocacy services to low income Hayward residents.

Summary of Project Proposed for FY 2007-08:

This proposal is to fund a full-time Family Advocate at the Family Resource Center in South Hayward. This person will assist low-income Hayward residents in need of help with housing, job training and placement referrals, food, health and mental health services, dental services, immigrations support services, information and referral and other case managements services.

HSC: The South Hayward Neighborhood Collaborative’s Family Resource Center is an example of how the services of many different non-profit community-based and faith-based health and human service providers can be coordinated to improve the delivery of services to those in need. This project was expecting a significant increase from Alameda County in FY 07-08, however, due to funding limitations, will be receiving less than expected from that source. In order to mitigate the loss of these funds, and to continue the operations of the Family Resource Center, the Commission recommends that an increase in funding be allocated to this project in the amount of \$30,000.

Staff: Staff concurs with the sentiments expressed by the Commission and support the recommendation of an increase in funding to this project. However, it is recommended that the project be supported in the amount of \$15,000 so that a greater amount of City Social Services funding remains available to support other projects.

The long-term goal of the FACES for the Future program is to increase the diversity among the healthcare workforce as well as provide at-risk youth in Hayward with the opportunity for professional career development.

HSC: This project is new to Hayward, but has an impressive track record through its program at the Oakland Children's Hospital in terms of the number of at-risk youth from low-income families who attend college with a focus toward a healthcare profession (such as: healthcare technician, therapist, nurse, physician, etc.). Consequently, the Commission recommends that this project receive support in the amount of \$25,000.

CED Staff: This project proposes to supplement the curriculum taught by the Eden Area Regional Occupational Program (Eden Area ROP) in Hayward, as well as provide health care internship opportunities to ROP students. While the staff concurs with the Commission's desire to support this project, it is recommended that a greater degree of the funding needed be sought from other funding sources so that City Social Services funding can be used to support other projects. Staff recommends that the funding for this project be limited to \$10,000.

The Keepin' It Real (KIR) project is based at the Tennyson Health Center, located at Tennyson High School, one of the primary care clinic sites managed by Tiburcio Vasquez Health Center. The KIR project is a collaborative between Tennyson Health Center, Cesar Chavez Middle School, and Hayward Community Day School. The three topics to be addressed include: teen violence prevention, alcohol and drug abuse, as well as pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. The KIR will achieve this through the following: Training 15 youth from Tennyson High Schools to become KIR peer educations, reach 450 unduplicated students at Cesar Chavez Middle School and 50 students from Hayward Community Day School through a series of 3 classroom presentations and finally conducting a school community-wide awareness campaign related to the issues of teen health.

Consequently, it is recommended by both the Commission and staff and that the this project not receive funding at this time. The applicant is encouraged to work with the Hayward Unified School Districts after-school (Y.E.P.) programs, as well as those offered through the Eden Youth and Family Center and the Hayward Area Park and Recreation District to serve the students identified as needing additional support.
